

New Parishioners: Welcome to St. Joan of Arc!





Greetings of Peace as we enter into the Season of Advent. We "wait in joyful hope." And we hope "things will get better in our world" with the rising cases of CoVid. Our preparations for Christmas (in our homes and church) will definitely need to be "flexible."

As we begin Advent, it might be good to reflect on the meaning and purpose of a symbol we often use in this Season: The Advent wreath.

Fr. Paul Turner writes about this season and a symbol of this season by saying, "An Advent wreath symbolizes our longing for the coming of Christ. The wreath is a circle of evergreen branches into which are set four candles. Traditionally three candles are violet and one is rose, but four violet or four white candles may also be used.

"The wreath symbolizes many things. Evergreens signify God's enduring promise of redemption, evident like green branches in the midst of snow. The circle signifies our hope for the return of Christ, whose kingdom will have no end. The colors of the candles match the traditional colors of the vesture for the four Sundays of Advent. Violet garments signify our penitent hope for salvation. The rose color, which *may* be worn on Advent's Third Sunday, signals that the season is nearly over – joy is at hand!

"The wreath's most luminous symbol is its growing light. One candle is lit on the First Sunday of Advent; two on the Second, three on the Third and all four on the Fourth. In the northern hemisphere, Advent comes at a time when the days decrease to their shortest length. As the hours of darkness increase, we light more candles on the wreath. The wreath, which symbolizes the coming of Christ, grows in intensity as the anniversary of Jesus' birth draws near.

"The Advent wreath may be used at home or at church. It could be blessed on the First Sunday of Advent. When used in homes, the wreath could be blessed by a family member and lit during the evening meal, to remind everyone of the true meaning of this holy season." Paul Turner is pastor of the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Kansas City, Missouri and director of the Office of Divine Worship for the Diocese of Kansas City - St Joseph. He holds a doctorate in sacred theology from Sant' Anselmo in Rome.

As we wait in joyful hope, let us be attentive to the coming of the Lord – who is with us every day!

The Sunday TV Mass is moving to a new TV channel, and a new time

The weekly television Mass produced by the Catholic Diocese of Cleveland is moving. Starting on Nov. 22, the Sunday television Mass will be seen at 10 a.m. on WUAB Channel 43, the CW43. This change provides viewers with an opportunity to take part in the weekly celebration of the Mass at a much more convenient time. In addition, WUAB Channel 43 is an over-the-air station that is accessible even to those without cable TV. Those with cable TV need only to check their local cable system listings to determine where WUAB is located on their local channel line-up.

The weekly TV Mass is produced by the Diocese of Cleveland and it originates from the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist in downtown Cleveland. The televised Mass has been a staple of religious programming on Northeast Ohio airwaves for decades, cultivating a dedicated and faithful following. It is hoped that viewers will continue to tune in on this new station at this new, more convenient time.

The TV Mass also can be accessed on demand starting Saturday evening and running throughout Sunday on the Diocese of Cleveland website, <u>dioceseofcleveland.org</u>. In addition, the Mass can be heard on the radio, at 4 p.m. Saturdays and 10:30 a.m. Sundays on <u>AM 1260 The Rock</u>. Also, radio station <u>WINT-1330 AM</u> airs the Mass at 9 a.m. each Sunday and <u>Cox Communications</u> cable subscribers can view the Mass at 11:30 a.m. Sunday on channel 45.
