

From the Pastor

Greetings of Peace.



Looking ahead, Thursday of this week is July 4 – Independence Day. On Thursday July 4 our parish morning mass will be celebrated at 9 AM. And thank you for remembering our Tuesday morning mass is celebrated at 8 AM in the "summer months."

Since we celebrate July 4 this week, here are some "reflections" on July 4 – back by popular demand! The U.S. national holiday has been celebrated on every continent, notes James R. Heintze, retired librarian at American University and author of The 4th of July Encyclopedia. "In 1934 Richard Byrd was in Antarctica at his base 'Little America'," Heintze said. "Byrd and his men set off fireworks in a storm when the temperature was actually quite warm for them, 33 degrees below zero."

Such July 4th festivities are as old as the United States itself.

In 1778, while George Washington celebrated the 4th of July with his troops in Princeton, New Jersey; Benjamin Franklin was in Paris, throwing a party for Americans and some French people who were supporters of America.

Some 4th of July traditions are timeless. "Parades, speeches, music, public readings of the Declaration of Independence--those were started in the days after the declaration was adopted and continue today," writes Heintze

Fireworks, first authorized by Congress for 4th of July, 1777, are another legacy. In our times, it is estimated that more than 14,000 displays of fireworks light up U.S. skies each July 4th.

Nineteenth- century Independence Days featured noisy artillery salutes, as explosives left over from various wars were fired all day during the 4th of July. The practice faded as cannons aged and fell into disrepair.

Meanwhile, new traditions have arisen--many of which would have surely stumped the Founding Fathers--like Hot Dog Eating contests!

John Adams said to his wife, Abigail, about America's independence, "I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated, by succeeding Generations, as the great anniversary festival..."

It turns out that when the Declaration of Independence was taken to the printer on July 4th, he printed that date on the top.

Americans have celebrated the 4th of July ever since 1776, though it officially declared a federal holiday in 1941.

Regarding July 4th, John Adams's Independence Day vision remains "on the mark" more than two centuries later. Adams is credited with saying, "It ought to be solemnized with Pomp and Parade, with Shews (Shows), Games, Sports...Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations from one End of this Continent to the other from this Time forward forever more."

From the Desk of Millie Prebel:



There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens. And what a season we have had!

We've done so much these past two years from Missions to prayer vigils, weddings, funerals, outings, Easter Vigils, even a Mary-thon. It's been a tremendously full time.

I'd like to share a few events that stand out to me. One had massive attendance and the other minimal. A reminder that it's not always how many, but who shows up.

We held an event called an Evening of Hope. It was a bereavement program but something different. Instead of going over the typical stages of grief we wanted to share what God tells us about death and life. I asked several people who navigated through a loss with grace and new purpose to speak after our prayer service. We had the program prepared, the speakers arranged and were anticipating good attendance. And then the skies opened, and it poured.

Attendance in a quantitative view was light but let me tell you what happened. There was a couple there that night that I had never seen before. After a few shared stories someone asked why they came.

We lost our 14-year-old daughter during Covid, and we have not stepped foot in this church since her funeral they shared. We listened and offered encouragement to come back to this community.

In who we are and what we do, they sought our help, our hope. I am convinced to this day that evening was for them.

The other that stands out to me was a prayer vigil many of you were there.

I found out a parishioner had suffered a brain hemorrhage, and her condition was dire. I prayed for pastoral wisdom and after consulting with a priest friend of theirs, he encouraged me to offer a Holy Hour. As many of you know the church was packed, so many people showed up to offer prayer and to support this family. It was a beautiful witness of who we are. Many in attendance that evening commented on feeling the real presence of the Holy Spirit that night. The family was overwhelmed with the support, but more importantly the prayers worked. Praise be to God!

We, the church, offer hope in our presence and prayers, our stories, our encouragement and empathy. A willingness to accompany another in rough times and to be there to celebrate the victories. We have done much of that in my time here and I couldn't be prouder to have been a small part of it.

This work will continue long after I'm gone, for I know the good work that the Lord has begun in you will come to fulfillment.

It has been my honor to serve with you. I will continue to keep you all in my prayers and am excited to see what's next.
